- "Of Flinton." Heir to family estates at Ryhill. Bur. at Humbleton 2 Apr. 1587 (Parish Register). Will dtd. 23 Mar. 1587, pr. 5 Oct. 1587. His name was on a list of gentlemen at Glover's Visitations of Yorkshire in 1558, but his pedigree was not recorded.

Ellen Newton (Lancelot; John, III; John, Jr.; John)

- bp. at Hedon 24 Feb. 1614.
m. Edward Carleton 3 Nov. 1636, at St. Martin Micklegate, York. He, b. in Hornsea, bp. at Beeford 20 Oct. 1610; s. of Walter and Jane (Gibbon) Carleton.
Ellen owned considerable property in Ryhill and Cammerton, which she sold in Apr. 1638, just before she and Edward, with their baby son, sailed for America in the company of Rev. Ezekiel Rogers, for Rowley, Mass., in the ship, "John of London," which also brought Stephen Dye and the first printing press to reach English No. America. (See Johnson's Wonder-Working Providence, p. 128, 1654.) The tercentenary of this press is commemorated in a postage stamp issued one month after the celebration at Rowley, Mass., 24-27 Aug. 1939)

Footnote to article on the Newton pedigree, found in "Ancestry of Ellen Newton, of Rowley, Mass.," by Dr. Tracy Elliott Hazen, in the N.E.H.G.R., v. 94, p. 18:

"In this epilogue it may be noted that it seemed unnecessary in the present article to attack the purely supposititious wife ascribed to Edward Carleton in Captain Percival Carleton's 'Memorials' in 1869, and since unquestioned here. American descendants will be quite willing to abandon the baseless legend of 'Ellen, daughter of Sir Thomas Denton,' in favor of this clear Newton ancestry. Ellen Newton, daughter of a forceful man who made his own way to success in his community, may be believed to have made her own important contribution in the settlement of Rowley. Furthermore, her inheritance through the ancient Grimston line discloses vistas for futher exploration."

ENGLISH ANCESTORS OF EDWARD CARLETON, IA

The name CARLETON, according to Cutter, is derived from the Saxon "ceorl," meaning "husbandman," and "ton," meaning "town," indicating that the chief occupation of the family originally was that of farming.

Two Carleton coats-of-arms are given by two different sources: Prescott in his A CARLETON GENEALOGY and HISTORY describes it thus:

ARMS: Ermine on a bend sable Three Pheons Argent
CREST: A dexter arm embowed proper, vested to the elbow gules, doubled ermine, holding a javelin argent.

As given in Cutter in his GENEALOGICAL AND PERSONAL MEMOIRS, V. 2, it reads:

ARMS: Argent on a Bend sable three mascles of the field
CREST: Out of a ducal coronet or an unicorn's head sable the horn twisted of the First and Second

The ARMS are essentially the same, only the devices and the colors being different. The CREST is entirely different, being optional with the owner.

Two different lines of descent are given by historians for Edward Carleton, who, with his wife and one child, came to Massachusetts in 1639. One credits him with having been Edward Carleton of Erasmus, St. Bartholomew's, London. This line goes back directly through eighteen generations to "Baldwin de Corlarletu, the first of a Cumberland family who resided at Carleton Hall, near Penrith, Cumberland," about the time of the Norman Conquest, 1066. In fact, "Carleton Hall Manor" was listed as belonging to Hakene when the Confessor's survey was made during the reign of Edward the Confessor, 1042-1066 A.D. This line is the one given by MacKenzie in his COLONIAL FAMILIES OF THE UNITED STATES. Sir Guy Carleton, Commander of the British Forces that attacked the Colonial Forces from Canada during the Revolution War via Lake Champlain, was descended from this line. But Dr. Tracy Elliot Hazen has disproved this theory. In the N.E.H.G.R., v. 93, p. 3, he says: "We quote this item from the parish register of St. Bartholomew by the Royal Exchange, London, 'Edward Carleton sonne of Arasmus and Elizabeth was christened the 3 of December 1620.'"

THE AMERICAN CARLETONS

EDWARD CARLETON, immigrant ancestor of all Carletons (Carltons) in the United States who stem from 17th century New England families of that name, was born in Yorkshire, England, where he was baptized 20 Oct. 1610, in Beeford. His earliest known ancestor was "THOMAS CULTON," as he spelled his name on the Subsidy of 1523/4. Thomas's son, JOHN CARLETON, was buried 21 Feb. 1576 in Brandesburton. He had two sons, Edward of Beeford, Esq., and THOMAS of Beeford, who was born abt. 1525-30, and married Jennett Wilson, "sister of Thomas Wilson, gentleman." THOMAS CARLETON made his wife, Jennett, the administrator of his estate 1 May 1582. Thomas and Jennett's son, JOHN CARLETON of beeford, was born abt. 1550-1555. He was a steward of the Manor Court 1586-1614, and was buried 27 Jan. 1622/23.

(Note: The double date is used to indicate the time according to two calendars, the Julian, which had been in use since 46 B.C. and began the year on Mar. 25th, and the Gregorian, established by Pope Gregory in 1582, correcting a slight error in the Julian calendar and beginning the year with January 1st. The English, being a Protestant nation, refused to accept the papal decree until 1752. Thus early dates in England and America are very often shown by a double year. The 27th of January 1622 was, according to the Old Style of dating, actually one year behind the date according to the New Style. In this genealogy, we have used the New Style.)

JOHN CARLETON'S wife was Ellen Strickland, daughter of Walter Strickland of Sizergh, Esq., who was living in 1622. Ellen was a direct descendant of Kings Edward the First, Second, and Third of England, as well as of certain royal lines of Scotland, France, and Spain. Her pedigree is clearly delineated in Frederick Weis's Ancestral Roots of Sixty Colonists, and goes back to Cerdic, King of the West Saxons, 519-534.

JOHN and Ellen (Strickland) Carleton of Beeford, Yorkshire, had six children: Ann, bp. 1578; Thomas, bp. 1579; George, bp. 1580; WALTER, bp. 1582; Robert, bp. 1584, d. in infancy, and John, bp. 1585. Of these, WALTER became the father of EDWARD, who migrated to America.

WALTER CARLETON, bp. 29 December 1582, lived in Beeford, Yorkshire, and died 4 Oct. 1623. He married Jane Gibbon (b. abt. 1595), their marriage license being recorded in Hornsea, in 1607. This couple had four children: EDWARD, bp. 20 Oct. 1610; Thomas, bp. 1612/13; William, bp. abt. 1617, d. 1639, and Ann, who was living in 1622.

Paver's List of Marriage Licenses shows one for Edward Carleton and Ellen Newton of St. Martin, Micklegate, daughter of John and Mary Newton of St. Martin, Micklegate, York. Their marriage took place 3 Nov. 1636. (Ellen was bp. 24 Feb. 1614, at the Church of St. Augustine, Hedon, York. Her pedigree is shown in N.E.H.G.R., v. 94, pgs. 13-18, and in Dr. Weis's Ancestral Roots.)

EDWARD CARLETON was administrator of the estate of Peter Gibbon in 1629. In 1638, he and his wife sold her land in Ryhill, Easter, and with their little son, JOHN, b. abt. 1637, joined a group of Puritans under the leadership of Rev. Ezekiel Rogers, which, in 1639, sailed for New England, settling north of Boston, along the northeastern coast of Massachusetts.

EDWARD and ELLEN (NEWTON) CARLETON IN ROWLEY, MASSACHUSETTS

In 1639, Edward Carleton was one of five men chosen "to order the affairs of the town of Rowley, Massachusetts." Rowley is situated in Essex County, in the northeast corner of the state.

On 20 October 1639, a second son was born to Edward and Ellen and named "Edward." In 1642, Edward, Sr., took his freeman's oath, and in June, his first daughter was welcomed into the home and named "Mary" (b. 2 Apr. 1642), for her maternal grandmother. A second daughter arrived 20 January 1644, and was named "Elizabeth."

Historians believe that Edward Carleton invested considerable money in property in Rowley. He certainly was a leading citizen. In November 1643, he was one of a committee chosen to survey and lay out the town, and in 1646, he was assigned a three acre lot. At the first Town Meeting in 1647, he was chosen "to judge every man's portion of land." In 1645, 1647, and 1648, he was a member of the Grand Jury at Ipswich, Mass., spending much of his time in Court Service, where he was recorded as "Mister Edward Carleton, a title of much distinction in those days." In 1648, he was made a Commissioner to "end small causes in Rowley."

Some historians state that Edward Carleton returned to England with his family in 1652, but Mary L. Holman, after careful research concerning this early ancestor, feels that there is proof that in 1648/9, he sailed for England to carry out some kind of mission to Yorkshire for the Colony and died before returning. She quotes a letter, dated at Rowley, Mass., 24 Jan. 1648 (which would be 1649, according to "New Style" dating), written by Rev. Ezekiel Rogers to Mr. William Sykes, merchant of Hull, Yorkshire. Quote:

"I heartily thank you for ye (the) Newes yo sent us. I have inclosed Mr. Carleton's acknowledgement. Also this letter y^t (that) yo may see how cheerfully he took leave of us. I shall not neede to putt yo in mind of his widow. - - -"

"Endorsed, Mr. Ezekiel Rogers, 24 11th mo. 1649
Rc. the 5 Feb. ans^d the 27th of Mar. 1650."

The 11th mo. would have been Feb. by the new calendar, and 1649 would have been 1650.

Before Edward Carleton sailed on his last journey, he appointed his wife and Mr. John Jewett his attorneys, and in that capacity, they sold some of his property. Ellen took her four children back to England. The oldest child, John, later returned to Rowley, Mass., and in 1661, confirmed the sale. He remained in Massachusetts to father a long line of descendants who have helped to people the western world.

CARLETONS - CARLTONS OF AMERICA

B John Carleton (Edward, IA)

- b. in Yorkshire, England, abt. 1637; brought to Rowley, Mass., by his parents in 1639. After his father's death, returned to England with his mother, brother, and sisters. Before 1656, he decided to cast his lot in the New World Community which his father had helped to found, in Rowley, Mass. Presumably settled his father's estate there. Became a Lieutenant in the State Militia. Moved to Bradford, Mass., and finally to Haverhill, Mass., where he was a well-known citizen. Died in Haverhill 22 Jan. 1668, at the early age of 31. His will, dtd. 15 Jan. 1668, mentions his wife, Hannah, his sons (unnamed) except that his son John was to receive a double portion; his "brothers," Philip Nelson and Jeremiah Jewett, and a friend, Ezekiel Northend, to be overseers. On the 30th of June 1696, the four sons, John, Joseph, Edward, and Thomas, signed the will. These four men are the forebears of most American Carletons (Carltons).
- m. Hannah Jewett, dau. of Joseph and Mary (Malinson) Jewett of Rowley, Mass., abt. 1657/8. Hannah, b. 15 June 1641, d. 21 Nov. 1679. After John Carleton's death, Hannah married Christopher Babbage of Salem, Mass., 5 Aug. 1674. He was a tailor, son of Roger and Hester Babbage of Totness, Devon., England. He came to New England in 1661. His first wife died in Salem.

In November 1678, Christopher and Hannah Babbage made a request of the Court to appoint certain relatives to be administrators of any estate left in New England by Edward Carleton and not received by his son John. The couple were enjoined to present an inventory at the Court in Ipswich.

C1 John Carleton, Jr. (John, B; Edward, IA)

- b. abt. 1660, probably in Rowley, Mass., d. at Andover, Mass., 5 Oct. 1745. Andover death record states: "in his 87th year." John, Jr. was a cooper. From the New England Historical and Genealogical Register (N.E.H.G.R.), v. 20: "Capt. John Carleton of the 'Monsuch' accompanied Capt. Underdown of the 'Falkland,' a warship, against the French fisheries of North America, 26 June 1707."

From Historical Sketches of Andover, Mass., by Bailey:

"John Carleton, whose name appears on the list of 1678, died at the age of eighty-seven. Neither he nor any of his descendants for a hundred years appear in any prominent connection, but the family in all its branches of descent has been of marked excellence and probity. The traces of them are few in the public records, they having, as appears, lived remarkably free from litigation and complaints which have made some names conspicuous, and have served (if no other good) to preserve interesting facts of manners and customs.

"An epitaph on the gravestone of one of the family perhaps sums up the character of the majority of the Carleton name:

'He was henvolent, just, and
peaceable with all.'"

 "1794 - Cap't. William Carlton commanded a pilot boat to carry a demand from the U.S. Government to Jamaica. Some U.S. ships had been detained there by the English, who, in some cases, sold the ships and confiscated the cargo. Congress voted to indemnify the merchants for their losses."
